Barbados Drug Information Network (BARDIN)

Status of BARDIN

- I Active participation with 7 government and 2 non government agencies.
- Data protocols including data collecting instruments has been identified, agreed upon and implemented.
- Data covering the period January 01-Dec 31,20102 has been collected.
- Draft Report completed
- Final report during August 2012.
- Reports will be issued on a half yearly basis with the first on January 2013, for the period January 01 through June, 31 2012.

BARDIN Report : Structure

- Demand reduction:
- The National Council on Substance Abuse (NCSA),
- The Edna Nicholls Centre (Rehabilitative services for secondary school students)
- The Psychiatric Hospital, Verdun House and CASA.
- Supply reduction and control:
- The Royal Barbados Police Force
- Her Majesty's Prison
- Barbados Customs and Excise Department
- Government Industrial School (Lone Juvenile penal institution).

Recent activity and Meetings

- On going Meeting were held during 2011 with participating agencies to establish data collection protocols
- I Drug Information Workshop, during October 2011.
- Workshop familiarize participants with BARDIN, create buy in to BARDIN and outline the role of the NCSA in the facilitation of BARDIN.

Observations

- A review of the existing research covering the period 2007 through 2010 and current drug related
- Notably, of all the substances reported, alcohol, tobacco and marijuana, were the three most commonly used among the adult population of Barbados.
- Research data also indicates that the highest percentage of current users of marijuana is found among the secondary school and adult populations.
- Marijuana is the drug motivating the demand for treatment particularly among males.
- There is also some concern as to the practice of poly drug use or the use of marijuana with other substances, namely alcohol and cocaine
- I Marijuana has also captured the attention of law enforcement, where most of the drug related offences involved marijuana.

Recent publications

- I The final BARDIN report will be published in August 2012, upon review of the NCSA Board.
- I This report will be accompanied with a one page Bulletin.

Future Plans

- I BARDIN will be used as a source document for drug policy.
- To provide data on costs of drug use
- It is envisaged by December 2014, a more complete comparative analysis of drug data can be achieved.
