

Report on the Sub – Regional Workshop in Trinidad and Tobago – Aug 2010

Establishing Standardized Data
Collection Systems for NGOs

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Background

- } Recognition of the following on NGO's
- } Need to collect data from the NGO's for the NDIS
- } Need to enhance:
 - The integrity of the data is being collected and improve the data sources.
- } Approval granted by the NDC to host a national workshop
- } During discussions with CARICOM, interest expressed in supporting participation of other member states - through the 9th EDF

Goal

Assist NGO's to:

- Collect data in a standardized format to meet their various reporting requirements
- Facilitate the submission of data on a structured basis to the relevant Drug Information Systems in countries.
- Discuss the long term goal - The contribution of data from treatment and rehabilitation centres, to a regional data base.

Participation

There were 35 participants which included:

- Representatives from 7 countries.
Staff of 19 local and regional Non Governmental Organizations
- CARICOM and
- CICAD

Methodology

} Presentations

- Drug Information Networks
- Data collection system in Barbados
- Data on the OASIS Drop in Centre
- Analysis of data and its usefulness

} Group Work

Participants worked on the following:

- Review of the Data collection form developed by the EULAC project
- Key terms and Definitions, and
- Implementation Plan

Issues Discussed

- } The implications of data for policy and practice
- } Data collection should be feasible, cost effective and integrated as a routine activity
- } Use of Indicators - Must address core data sets and be manageable.
- } Data should be based on scientific principles to ensure reliability and validity
- } Standardization of - Definitions, scope of collection, and the reporting period

Issues Cont'd

- } Pre- existing data collection systems should be utilized where available.
- } Agencies without data collection systems should be assisted in development of a template.
- } Client confidentiality must be maintained – Use of unique identifiers
- } Methods should be adapted to each country's needs
- } The data variable fields should include (Client, Drug use and Treatment)

Challenges Identified

- } There is no clear understanding or consensus on the definition of an institution which is a 'treatment center'.
- } This has implications for the data to be collected
- } This needs to be resolved during the planning stages of the information system.
- } Whichever definition is adopted should meet regional and international criteria.

Areas For Further Development

- } Agencies and policy makers are to be sensitized on the DIN in all countries

- } Identification of a Coordinating Agency (Drug Council) to:
 - Review data submitted for clarity and reliability
 - Assess each agency prior to establishing a network
 - Establish and maintain contact with agencies to promote co-operation and assistance

Agreed Next Steps

- } National Drug Councils to be sent the report on the outcomes of the meeting
- } Standardized forms to be re-worked with a view to facilitating implementation within 6 months
- } CICAD to undertake the review of the forms and circulate to agencies
- } National Drug Councils and CARICOM to provide support to NGO's

Current Status

- } CICAD sought funding for a pilot project
- } Discussions were held on undertaking a further training workshop for NGO's
- } Pilot project to be undertaken in the Caribbean
- } CICAD to update this meeting on next activities
