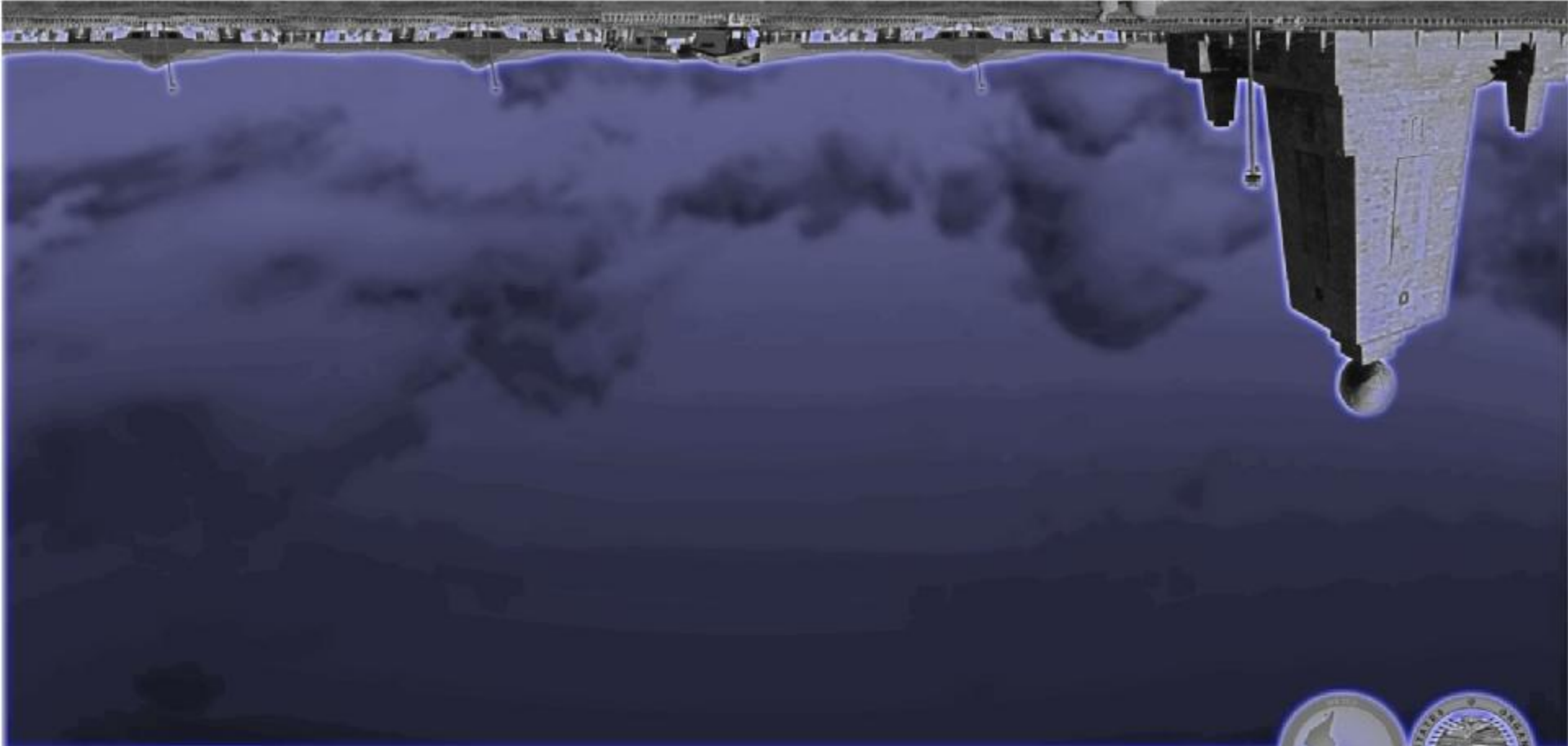

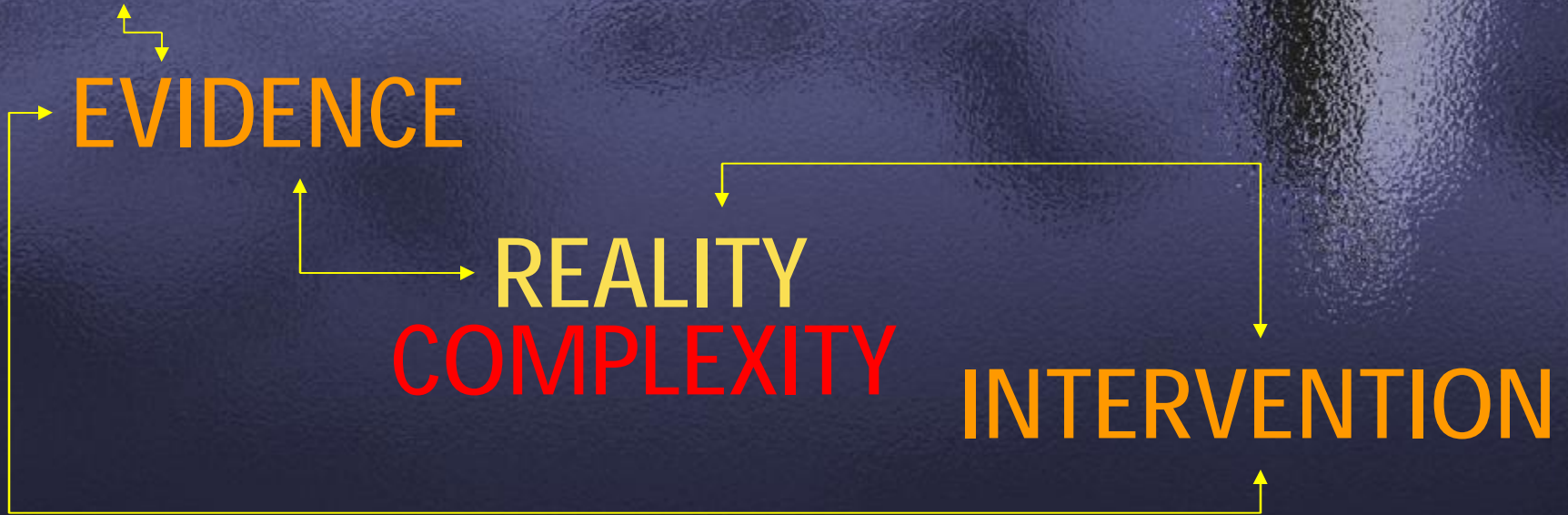

Evidence for public policy



- § Information ≠ evidence.
- § Little evidence.
- § Poor participation of academic and scientific community.
- § Plain, limited and sectorial approaches.

Evidence for public policy

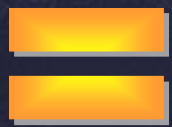
- § Focus on controversial and simple cause-effect approaches: drug use-violence, drug use-crime, drugs-narco-trafficking, drugs-dependence, drugs-mental health, drugs-social defragmentation.
- § Drugs are an essential part of everyday life, together and in interaction with other phenomena: love/violence, peace/conflict, legality/crime, poverty/wealth, health/disease,...

Evidence for drug policy

- § Simple solutions = radical policy.
- § Efficacy curve becomes more rigid.
- § Negative effects felt on other fields covered by other policies.

Evidence for drug policy

- § Not based on evidence but on intuition and perceptions.
- § Affected by strong social beliefs.
- § Based on “fear of drugs, of those linked to them, of disease, of crime, of violence.
- § Inadequate tools and insufficient and unbalanced resources.
- § Direct impact on electoral logic.
- § Similar prescriptions for everyone.

Present drug policy

DRUG USE

- § "Sick" or "deviant" paradigm.
- § Solution = profilaxis, sanitary tools, directed social insertion.
- § Social beliefs: exclusion, internment, indifference (God & the stick).
- § Lack of ways for social integration.
- § Main impact on most vulnerable groups.
- § Lack of assumption of the problem: politicians, professionals, civil servants, academia, media, society as a whole.
- § Strong human right abuses and problems to access health and social services.

Present drug policy

DRUG SUPPLY

- § "Criminal" paradigm.
- § Solution = repression, penal law protagonism.
- § Social beliefs: exclusion, internment, indifference (Justice & stick).
- § Lack of ways for social integration. Prisons as crime universities, abuse, disease, death.
- § Main impact on vulnerable groups.
- § Lack of assumption of the problem: politicians, professionals, civil servants, academia, media, society as a whole.
- § Strong human right abuses and problems to access health and social services.

Present drug policy

SUMMING UP...

- § Bad diagnosis, wrong cause-effect relations established.
- § Inadequate or non existant tools.
- § "Laissez-faire" policy, not doing anything.
- § Limited resources.
- § Negative or poor results.
- § "Business going" and "trash controlled".
- § Poverty punishment.
- § Work not done and everyone looking away, hoping it does not affect us.

Some notes on complexity

- § Individuals, families, groups, communities, society.
- § Need to pay attention to roles:
 - Diversity of actors in the demand and supply chains.
 - Production, trafficking and use on one side, and control and fiscalization on the other.
- § Actors generate and suffer problems.
- § In-depth look at every actor's characteristics.

- § In-depth look at social practices of people's relationship to drugs.
- § Special attention to those social practices of interest for public policy because they "weaken people's social integration processes".

§ In-depth study of variables linked to contexts.

§ Places, spaces, cultures, relationships...

§ Diversity of benefits, meanings, significances, impacts.

- § Need to integrate all variables.
- § Special attention to variable's interactions of interest for public policy.
- § Need to adapt interventions to complexity.
- § Theory of networking allows for a better understanding that takes into account this complex entanglement of relationships that, on one hand, build the drug phenomenon and, on the other hand, the needed changes.

§ Need to generate more affirmative ways for individuals, families, groups and communities to be socially integrated

§ We have to look at actors, links and contexts to identify those with a greater risk (vulnerability-threat) and to treat them adequately within their complexity.



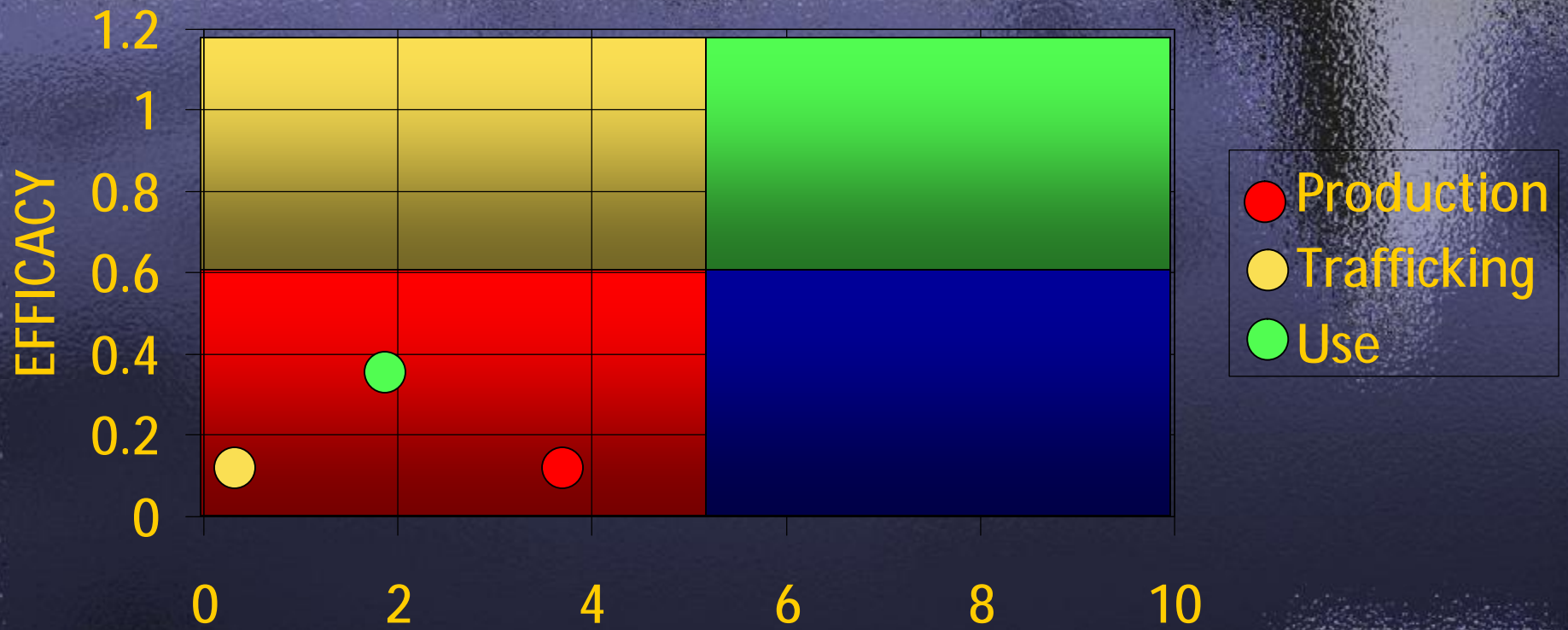

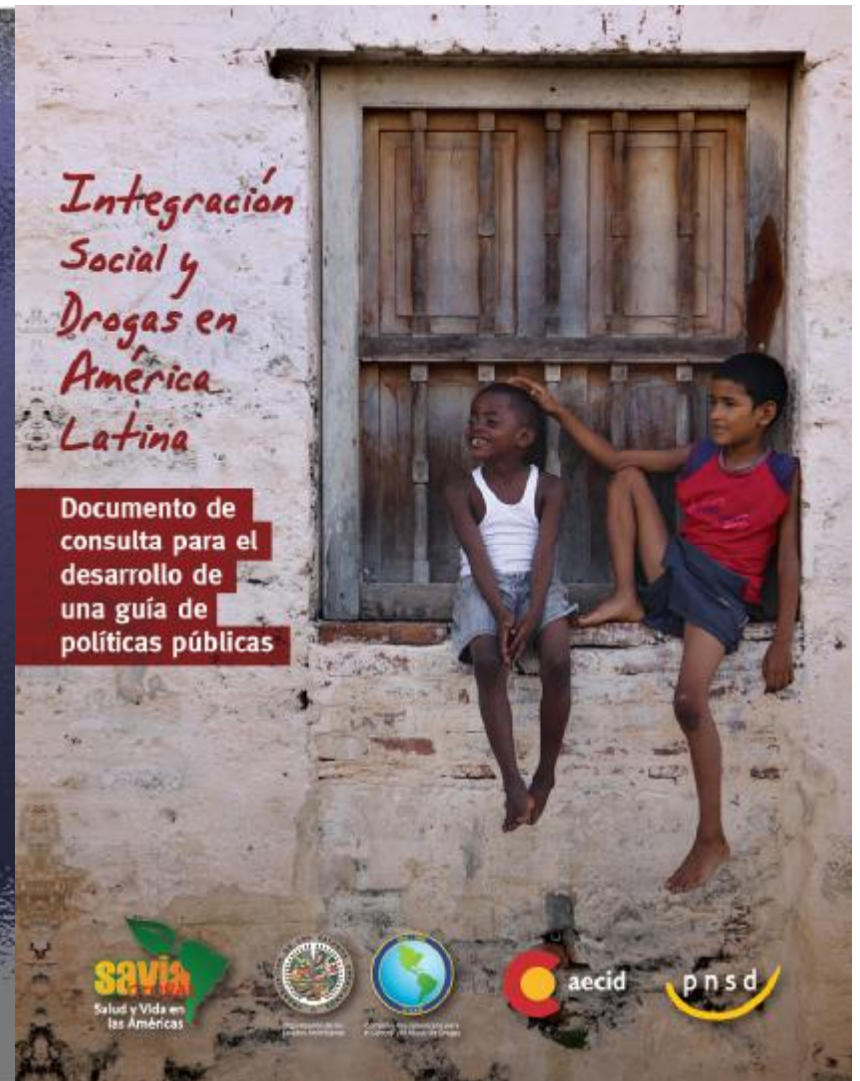


SOCIAL INTEGRATION

Policy analysis exercise

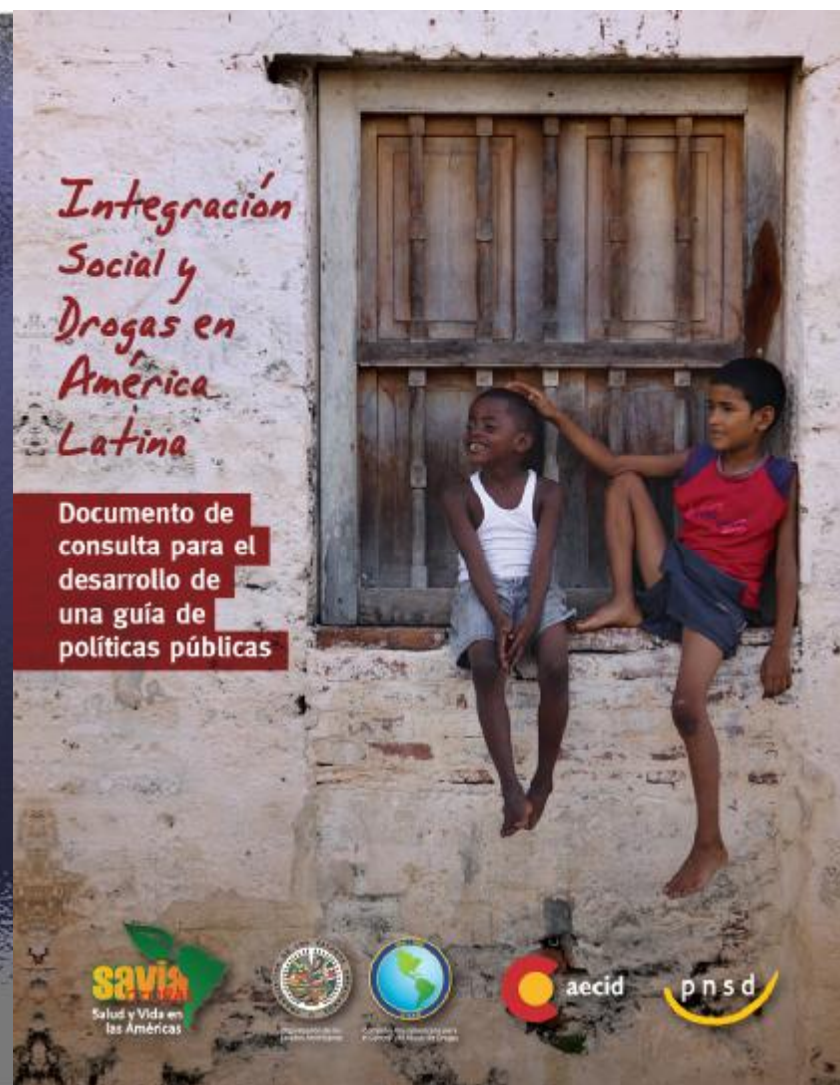
Public policy guide on social integration and drugs



It will include:

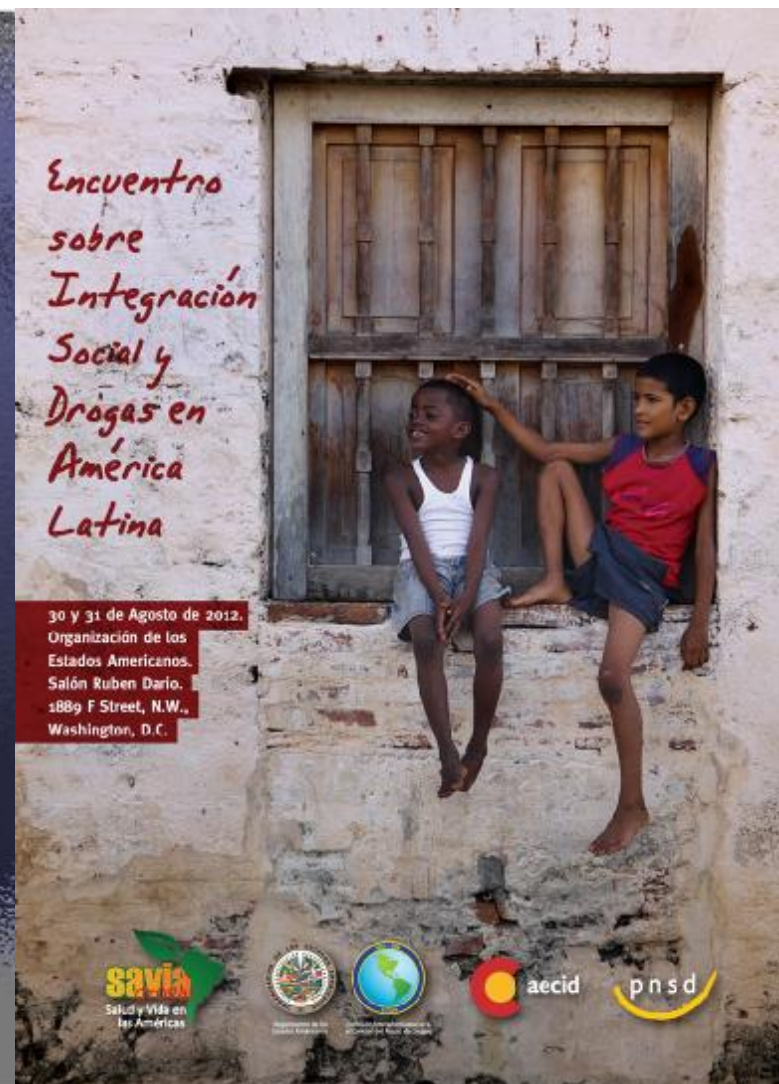
- § Institutional and regulatory framework.

 - Actors, contexts and links of people to drugs.
 - Present policies' analysis, their limits and gaps.

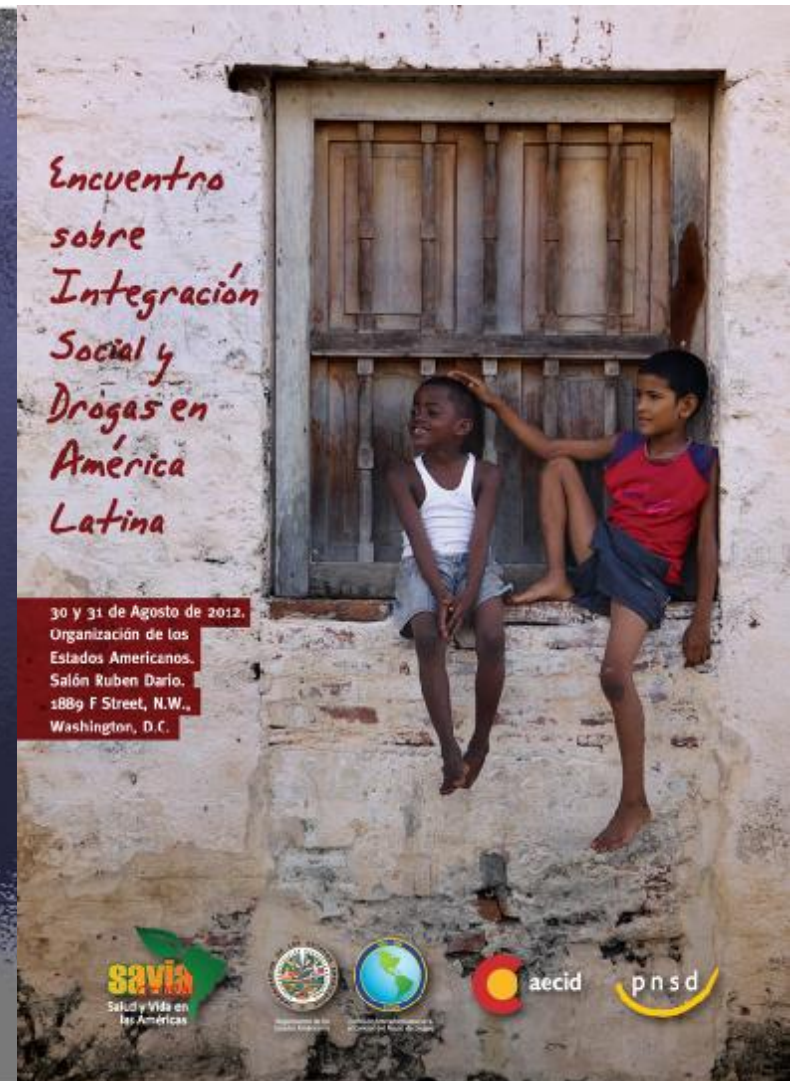
