



- → Radicalization
- → Barriers between people of different cultures and religions
- → Lack of rule of law and human rights





### **Security Planning Measures**

- → Installing a community relations group to engage with host communities
- → Installing a community policing scheme to actively engage communities into local safety and security
- → Supporting the inclusion of vulnerable and marginalized youth when recruiting personnel f
- → Offering trainings to police officers and security personnel on respecting diversity, gender equality, human rights, and the engagement of youth and communities
- → Following a Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) approach when building new infrastructure and regenerating urban spaces
